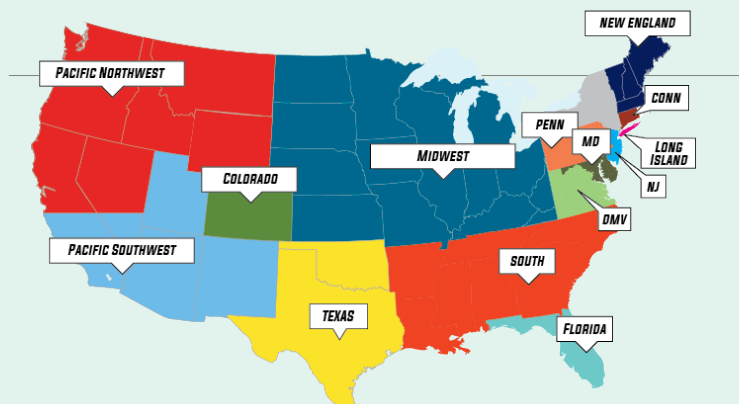
## NATIONAL ALL STAR GAMES



The National All-Star Games, organized by B'More Lax Co., began as a post-high-school lacrosse showcase aiming to unify top talent from across the nation. Despite the disruption of the pandemic, the inaugural event in 2020 succeeded in drawing 800+ players from 32 states and D.C. to Maryland. It featured 77 games across three classes—a testament to the community's commitment and flexibility amid shifting logistics and restrictions. Founder Ryan McClernan reflected on the effort, calling it “a logistical challenge... a testament to the devotion of the national lacrosse community”

By the 2023 edition, media outlets like Lacrosse All Stars lauded its return, noting the convergence of 14 regional teams representing both traditional East Coast strongholds and emerging markets from the South, Mid-America, and Pacific Southwest Lacrosse All Stars. The event's structure includes “blind try-outs,” regional selection, and gear—all designed to elevate visibility and opportunity for elite players

The National All-Star Games have swiftly become a benchmark for elite lacrosse competition—melding nationwide talent, college exposure, and regional pride. From humble beginnings amid logistical constraints in 2020 to bold showdowns at state-of-the-art facilities, the event continues to grow in prestige and impact. Participation trends reflect both its popularity and adaptive strategies—like the 2025 “Consider Me” Application. Any player in the USA may submit film and be considered for the event. **The innovative “Consider Me” application also has a college coach review the film and send a report card to the applicant, which has been very well received.** Powerful player and coach testimonials highlight the camaraderie and competitive excellence that define this unique showcase.

## Observations

**Consistency at the top level:** The Senior All-American Game has maintained strong participation every year (46–47 athletes), showing stability and high demand among the nation's best players. Having nearly 50 elite seniors annually highlights the prestige of being selected for this showcase.

**Steady growth in registrations:** Player registrations have consistently remained in the 900–1,200+ range, with 2024 marking the highest year on record (1,272) thanks to the addition of a 7th-grade division. Even after returning to four divisions in 2025, the event still drew over 1,180 players—demonstrating sustainable strength and continued interest from across the country.

**Flexibility and innovation in format:** The decision to experiment with a 7th-grade division in 2024 and to introduce direct invitations in 2025 shows the event's willingness to evolve in order to deliver the best

possible experience. These adjustments keep the event fresh and forward-thinking, ensuring both quality and inclusivity.

**Coaching engagement is strong:** Made up of 85% Division 1 coaches, with 148 coaches total in 2025, the event consistently draws a large and influential recruiting presence. Having 100+ coaches every year cements its role as a can't-miss opportunity for evaluating players.

**Nationwide player reach:** The event attracts athletes from traditional hotbeds (Maryland, New York, Pennsylvania) as well as growing regions (South, Midwest, West Coast), ensuring it lives up to its reputation as a true national showcase.



The National Senior All-Star Game has quickly become one of the most prestigious components of the National All-Star Games, bringing together the very best graduating players from across the country. First introduced in 2022, the Senior Game was created to showcase elite talent at the culmination of players' high school careers and provide them with a final opportunity to compete in a nationally recognized, college-recruiting spotlight event. Participation has been consistent, with 46–47 seniors competing each year, a testament to the exclusivity and competitive prestige of selection.

#### *Prestigious Venues & Growing Visibility*

The event reached a new milestone in 2024, when the Senior Game was hosted at the USA Lacrosse facility in Sparks, Maryland, widely regarded as the premier stage for American lacrosse. Playing in the same venue where national teams train added to the athletes' sense of honor and recognition. The following year in 2025, the game returned to the Sparks complex, reinforcing its positioning as a flagship national event with both tradition and visibility.

#### *Memorable Games & Standout Performances*

The Senior All-Star Game has already produced unforgettable moments. In 2024, the Nationals edged the Americans in a dramatic 15–14 overtime victory, capped off by University of Maryland commit Spencer Ford, who scored five goals—including the OT winner—and earned MVP honors. The 2025 contest continued the tradition of competitive drama, with the Nationals once again prevailing, this time 16–14, behind the standout play of Aidan Seibel (MVP, eight saves) and Cam Kelley, who led all scorers with a hat trick.



## The National Senior All-American Game

#### *Player & Coach Perspectives*

Beyond the statistics, the Senior Game has become a cultural touchpoint for players and coaches alike. Competing in the event signifies that an athlete belongs among the nation's top echelon, while college recruiters value it as a rare opportunity to watch the best seniors battle head-to-head. The atmosphere reflects both celebration and competition—a culmination of years of hard work, combined with the excitement of playing alongside and against future college teammates and rivals.

#### *A Platform for National Recognition*

What sets the Senior All-Star Game apart is the combination of elite competition, professional game presentation, and national exposure. For the athletes, it is both a capstone to their club and high school careers and a launchpad toward collegiate success. For families, coaches, and recruiters, it is a chance to celebrate the very best the sport has to offer on a national stage.



### **Held at Tierney Field at the US Lacrosse National Headquarters**

Competing in Sparks at the USA Lacrosse facility signifies not just elite status, but the honor of playing where the sport's biggest moments are made.



The NCAA summer blackout period was created with the right intention: to give athletes a much-needed break from the year-round grind of recruiting, training, and competing. The Intercollegiate Men's Lacrosse Coaches Association has wisely recognized the need to streamline this period, and we believe the National All-Star Games (NASG) is the most logical and impactful single event to carry the torch.

The NASG already provides everything the blackout window is designed to balance: elite competition, high-level coaching exposure, and meaningful player experience—without unnecessary wear and tear. Since its inception in 2020, the event has grown into a national showcase with players representing every corner of the country, from traditional hotbeds to emerging markets. Participation has been remarkably consistent, with nearly 1,200 players registered in 2025 across four divisions and 47 seniors selected for the marquee All-American Game.

The event has also demonstrated a commitment to player health and sustainability. In 2024, the addition of a single 7th-grade division created a record 1,272 registrations, yet organizers made the strategic decision to return to four divisions in 2025, prioritizing quality over quantity and reducing the physical burden on young athletes. Last year, the Senior Game drew 148 college coaches, ensuring unparalleled recruiting opportunities without requiring athletes to attend multiple events in a compressed summer window.

Just as importantly, the National All-Star Games will take place regardless of IMCLA affiliation. The top players are consistently attending year after year. *If the IMCLA adopts the NASG as the singular event during the blackout period, they can ensure athletes are seen in the best possible environment—one national stage, one premier venue, and one unforgettable experience—while fulfilling the mission to protect players' health and reduce overuse during the most demanding stretch of summer the lacrosse calendar.*
